Celebrant:Blessed be God: Father, Son, and Holy Spirit.People:And blessed be his kingdom, now and for ever. Amen.Celebrant:There is one Body and one Spirit;People:There is one hope in God's call to us;Celebrant:One Lord, one Faith, one Baptism;People:One God and Father of all.

# The Collect of the Day

Celebrant: The Lord be with you. *People: And also with you.* Celebrant: Let us pray.

O God, whose Son Jesus is the good shepherd of your people: Grant that when we hear his voice we may know him who calls us each by name, and follow where he leads; who, with you and the Holy Spirit, lives and reigns, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.* 

# The First Reading: 1 John 3:16-24

We know love by this, that he laid down his life for us– and we ought to lay down our lives for one another. How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help?

Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action. And by this we will know that we are from the truth and will reassure our hearts before him whenever our hearts condemn us; for God is greater than our hearts, and he knows everything. Beloved, if our hearts do not condemn us, we have boldness before God; and we receive from him whatever we ask, because we obey his commandments and do what pleases him.

And this is his commandment, that we should believe in the name of his Son Jesus Christ and love one another, just as he has commanded us. All who obey his commandments abide in him, and he abides in them. And by this we know that he abides in us, by the Spirit that he has given us.

Reader: The Word of the Lord. *People: Thanks be to God.*

The Gospel: John 10:11-18

Clergy: The Holy Gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ according to John. *People: Glory to you, Lord Christ.* 

Jesus said, "I am the good shepherd. The good shepherd lays down his life for the sheep. The hired hand, who is not the shepherd and does not own the sheep, sees the wolf coming and leaves the sheep and runs away—and the wolf snatches them and scatters them. The hired hand runs away because a hired hand does not care for the sheep. I am

the good shepherd. I know my own and my own know me, just as the Father knows me and I know the Father. And I lay down my life for the sheep. I have other sheep that do not belong to this fold. I must bring them also, and they will listen to my voice. So there will be one flock, one shepherd. For this reason the Father loves me, because I lay down my life in order to take it up again. No one takes it from me, but I lay it down of my own accord. I have power to lay it down, and I have power to take it up again. I have received this command from my Father."

# The Presentation and Examination of Candidates

The Celebrant says, The Candidate(s) for Holy Baptism will now be presented.

Then the candidates unable to answer for themselves are presented individually by the Parents and Godparents, as follows Parents and Godparents: I present N. to receive the Sacrament of Baptism.

When all infants and young children have been presented, the Celebrant asks the parents and godparents, Will you be responsible for seeing that the child you present is brought up in the Christian faith and life? Parents and Godparents: I will, with God's help.

Celebrant: Will you by your prayers and witness help this child to grow into the full stature of Christ? Parents and Godparents: I will, with God's help.

Then the Celebrant asks the following questions of the parents and godparents who speak on behalf of the infants and younger children,

Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness that rebel against God? Answer: I renounce them.

Do you renounce the evil powers of this world which corrupt and destroy the creatures of God? Answer: I renounce them.

Do you renounce all sinful desires that draw you from the love of God? Answer: I renounce them.

Do you turn to Jesus Christ and accept him as your Savior? Answer: I do.

Do you put your whole trust in his grace and love? Answer: I do.

Do you promise to follow and obey him as your Lord? Answer: I do.

After all have been presented, the Celebrant addresses the congregation, saying Will you who witness these vows do all in your power to support these persons in their life in Christ? **People: We will.** 

The Celebrant then says these or similar words Let us join with those who are committing themselves to Christ and renew our own baptismal covenant.

# **The Baptismal Covenant**

BCP 304

Celebrant: Do you believe in God the Father? **People: I believe in God, the Father almighty, creator of heaven and earth.** 

Celebrant: Do you believe in Jesus Christ, the Son of God?

People: I believe in Jesus Christ, his only Son, our Lord, he was conceived by the power of the Holy Spirit and born of the Virgin Mary, He suffered under Pontius Pilate, was crucified, died, and was buried. He descended to the dead. On the third day he rose again. He ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father. He will come again to judge the living and the dead.

Celebrant: Do you believe in God the Holy Spirit?

People: I believe in the Holy Spirit, the holy catholic Church, the communion of saints, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of the body, and the life everlasting.

Celebrant: Will you continue in the apostles' teaching and fellowship, in the breaking of the bread, and in the prayers? **People: I will, with God's help.** 

Celebrant: Will you persevere in resisting evil, and, whenever you fall into sin, repent and return to the Lord? *People: I will, with God's help.* Celebrant: Will you proclaim by word and example the Good News of God in Christ? *People: I will, with God's help.* 

Celebrant: Will you seek and serve Christ in all persons, loving your neighbor as yourself? **People: I will, with God's help.** 

Celebrant: Will you strive for justice and peace among all people, and respect the dignity of every human being? *People: I will, with God's help.* 

### **Prayers for the Candidates**

*The Celebrant then says to the congregation,* Let us now pray for these persons who are to receive the Sacrament of new birth.

Leader: Deliver them, O Lord, from the way of sin and death.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Open their hearts to your grace and truth.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Fill them with your holy and life-giving Spirit.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Keep them in the faith and communion of your holy Church.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Teach them to love others in the power of the Spirit.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Send them into the world in witness to your love.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

Leader: Bring them to the fullness of your peace and glory.

People: Lord, hear our prayer.

The Celebrant says,

Grant, O Lord, that all who are baptized into the death of Jesus Christ your Son may live in the power of his resurrection and look for him to come again in glory; who lives and reigns now and forever. *Amen.* 

# Thanksgiving over the Water

The Celebrant blesses the water, first saying The Lord be with you. **People: And also with you.** 

Celebrant: Let us give thanks to the Lord our God. *People: It is right to give him thanks and praise.* 

Celebrant: We thank you, Almighty God, for the gift of water. Over it the Holy Spirit moved in the beginning of creation. Through it you led the children of Israel out of their bondage in Egypt into the land of promise. In it your Son Jesus received the baptism of John and was anointed by the Holy Spirit as the Messiah, the Christ, to lead us, through his death and resurrection, from the bondage of sin into everlasting life. We thank you, Father, for the water of Baptism. In it we are buried with Christ in his death. By it we share in his resurrection. Through it we are reborn by the Holy Spirit. Therefore in joyful obedience to your Son, we bring into his fellowship those who come to him in faith, baptizing them in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

# At the following words, the Celebrant touches the water

Now sanctify this water, we pray you, by the power of your Holy Spirit, that those who here are cleansed from sin and born again may continue for ever in the risen life of Jesus Christ our Savior. To him, to you, and to the Holy Spirit, be all honor and glory, now and for ever. **Amen.** 

# The Baptisms (seated)

Each candidate is presented by name to the Celebrant, who then pours water upon the candidate and says, N., I baptize you in the Name of the Father, and of the Son, and of Holy Spirit. You are sealed by the Holy Spirit in Baptism and marked as Christ's own for ever. **Amen.**

When all have been baptized, the Celebrant says:

Celebrant: Let us pray. Heavenly Father, we thank you that by water and the Holy Spirit you have bestowed upon these your servants the forgiveness of sin, and have raised them to the new life of grace. Sustain them, O Lord, in your Holy Spirit. Give them an inquiring and discerning heart, the courage to will and to persevere, a spirit to know and to love you, and the gift of joy and wonder in all your works. *Amen.* 

Celebrant: Let us welcome the newly baptized.

People: We receive you into the household of God. Confess the faith of Christ crucified, proclaim his resurrection, and share with us in his eternal priesthood.

The Peace (standing)

Celebrant: The peace of the Lord be always with you. *People: And also with you.*




Then, facing the Holy Table, the Celebrant proceeds

It is right, and a good and joyful thing, always and everywhere to give thanks to you, Father Almighty, Creator of heaven and earth.


This Proper Preface is said by the Celebrant,

The people stand or kneel. Then the Celebrant continues,

We give thanks to you, O God, for the goodness and love which you have made known to us in creation; in the calling of Israel to be your people; in your Word spoken through the prophets; and above all in the Word made flesh, Jesus, your Son. For in these last days you sent him to be incarnate from the Virgin Mary, to be the Savior and Redeemer of the world. In him, you have delivered us from evil, and made us worthy to stand before you. In him, you have brought us out of error into truth, out of sin into righteousness, out of death into life.

At the following words concerning the bread, the Celebrant is to hold it, or to lay a hand upon it; and at the words concerning the cup, to hold or place a hand upon the cup and any other vessel containing wine to be consecrated.

On the night before he died for us, our Lord Jesus Christ took bread; and when he had given thanks to you, he broke it, and gave it to his disciples, and said, "Take, eat: This is my Body, which is given for you. Do this for the remembrance of me." After supper he took the cup of wine; and when he had given thanks, he gave it to them, and said, "Drink this, all of you: This is my Blood of the new Covenant, which is shed for you and for many for the forgiveness of sins. Whenever you drink it, do this for the remembrance of me."

Therefore, according to his command, O Father,

# We remember his death, we proclaim his resurrection, we await his coming in glory;

#### The Celebrant continues

And we offer our sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving to you, O Lord of all, presenting to you, from your creation, this bread and this wine.

We pray you, gracious God, to send your Holy Spirit upon these gifts that they may be the Sacrament of the Body of Christ and his Blood of the new Covenant. Unite us to your Son in his sacrifice, that we may be acceptable through him, being sanctified by the Holy Spirit. In the fullness of time, put all things in subjection under your Christ, and bring us to that heavenly country where, with all your saints, we may enter the everlasting heritage of your sons and daughters; through Jesus Christ our Lord, the firstborn of all creation, the head of the Church, and the author of our salvation.

By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. **AMEN.**

# John Ireland: Greater love hath no man

"Greater Love Hath No Man" by John Ireland, composed in 1912, is a well-known choral masterpiece that captures the solemnity and sacrifice of war. The texts are biblical and are taken from the Song of Solomon, the Gospel of John and various letters of Peter and Paul. With its lush harmonies and evocative melodies, the piece conveys both the anguish of conflict and the nobility of selflessness. Through powerful choral passages, Ireland paints a poignant picture of courage and compassion, reminding listeners of the enduring power of love amidst adversity. "Greater Love Hath No Man" stands as a timeless tribute to the human spirit and the ultimate sacrifice made in the name of love and duty.
